Stephen Chu was the US Secretary of Energy. He holds at least 10 patents and a list of honorary university degrees. He has written hundreds of scientific papers. He is a member of the Royal Academy of Engineering, the National Academy of Sciences, the American Philosophical Society, the Chinese Academy of Sciences, and the Institute of Physics. In 2014, he gave the Romanes Lecture at Oxford on climate change.

Reflection: Victoria Manolo Draves

What does it mean to be a pioneer, or trailblazer, and how can it inspire a group of people?

In 1948, Victoria Manolo Draves was the first American woman diver *ever* to get gold medals for *both* the ten-meter platform and the three- meter springboard. She was the first Asian-American, man or woman, to win Olympic gold medals. In *LIFE* magazine in 1949, she was named one of the top two US athletes competing at those 1948 Olympics. Before Olympic in London, she was winning national competitions.

Questions:

1. How might her Filipino heritage help her goals?

2. What struggles might she face becoming a pioneer?

3. How might one practice for diving?

4. Research Draves using the text. Write a first-person essay as if you are her, before winning Olympic gold. - Use facts and dates from the text.

Reflection: Shahid Khan

How hard might it be to succeed, coming from another land?

Shahid Khan, the billionaire Pakistani-American that owns the Jacksonville Jaguars football team, is a board member of the NFL Foundation, and owns a Premier League soccer team. He almost bought England's Wembley Stadium. He invested in All Elite Wrestling. In 1967, young Khan had barely any cash to his name. He started by washing dishes, sleeping at a YMCA, and making bumpers for cars.

Questions:

1. What good would you do if you were a billionaire?

2. What difficult jobs would you do to earn money?

3. How would you define the word focus, and what examples can you give?

4. Using the text, find what you think are the three most important events in Khan's life on his way to success.Explain why you think so.

5. Engineering is part of Khan's success. Research examples of innovation in engineering, such as architecture, bridge design, car design, etc. What part of the design is interesting and innovative?

6. It doesn't take billions to do good in the world. Research and compare two socially-minded people. - Find two that are quite different in terms of cultural or financial background.
